
Site is offering visitors a new way to enjoy local history: a booklet of historic photos and exact coordinates for seeing modern Bement from the same vantage points.

Composer's loved ones compose a digital memorial

Family, friends of John Balamos seek web visitors

A website honoring the late John Balamos of Decatur and New York City has had more than 17,000 hits. The goal is to reach 20,000 hits by Tuesday, Nov. 19, the 86th anniversary of

his birth. From humble roots, Balamos wrote music from 1960-2009 — complete musicals, theatrical scores, children's theatre, Shakespearean pieces, Greek pieces, jazz. He wrote the soundtrack for "Hercules in New York," a satire film featuring Arnold

During his last 25 years, Balamos was senior music director at the prestigious 92nd Street Y in New York City. He died Feb. 9, 2011, after a full day of work followed by dinner with family and friends, leaving a legacy as an accomplished pianist, music teacher, composer, beloved family member and friend.

The website, www.john balamos.com, was established with the hope of building a music foundation for the perpetuity of his work. Under the composer tab on the website are two music videos of early Balamos compositions directed and performed by Millikin University students.

a student's life.



Wanted: WWII vet stories

This is for World War II veterans.

Have you talked with Patrick Sullivan? The 20year-old Millikin University senior wants to contact you and you, all Decatur and Macon County World

War II veterans. He's compiling information about your experiences to be published in a book. Proceeds from the book sales will go to pre-serving the World War II Memorial.

He's collecting stories by contacting veterans from lists I supplied last year. He has about 40 stories in hand from

the lists and from visiting Imboden Creek and Eagle Ridge retirement homes. He also has sent letters to a number of veterans.



Yes, we have the World War II Memorial in front of the Decatur Civic Center with your name on it. The book would add more documentation of your service, preserving information your children, your grandchildren and their children will want to know in years to come.

So far as I know, there is no comprehensive book of this kind. E.E. "Pete" Nicholls, who proposed the World War II Memorial and worked diligently for it, compiled a 1991 book "Heroes in Our Midst," 330 pages, which listed the names of Macon County veterans from World War I through the Persian Gulf War and included some photos and articles.

When Nicholls and Gordon Brenner began research for the World War II Memorial, they found many more names. Sullivan knows he needs many more stories to finish a book with enormous historical importance.

He considers a talk with Art Jacoby Sr. most interesting. Jacoby, in his mid-90s, talked about his Navy days on the LST (landing ship tank) he served on in the South Pacific and about the battles of Iwo

Expressing gratitude never goes out of style

Dear Abby: With the holidays approaching, a reminder is in order. People: Don't forget those thank-vou notes! I don't mean an email, but a REAL, honest-to-gosh thank-you note sent through the mail with postage.

My mother always told me that a gift is not truly yours until a proper thank-you has been sent. She said it "completed the transfer." I was not allowed to play with the item or use it until that note was written.

This is especially true for young people today, who seemingly were not taught this in school or by their parents. Very young children can draw a picture, and the parent can add a line to say it was drawn to express thanks. As the child matures, he/she can use his/her own words of

I can't tell you how many parents comment on the absence of this display of etiquette. Good manners are never out of date. They are noticed and appreciated. From time to time I have seen you mention your booklet on "How to Write Letters." If it includes a section on thank-you notes, I'm sure it would be helpful to a lot of

people in the next two months.

- Elinor in Surprise, Ariz. **Dear Elinor:** The booklet does. Not a day goes by that I don't receive letters and emails from readers who are upset enough to write because they haven't received a thank-you note for a birthday, graduation, wedding or holiday gift they sent. Some of the writers say they are so hurt and offended that they will stop giving gifts because they were left hanging, wondering if their gift was ever received The problem may be that many parents no longer insist their children practice this courtesy, so the kids never learn how to do it.

Chief among the reasons that thank-you notes aren't sent is that many people don't know what to say. They think

the note has to be a long, flowery composition when, in fact, short and to the point is more effective.

Keeping a notepad handy when opening gifts and immediately taking a moment to jot down the first thought that comes to mind is helpful. (Example: Do you like the color? The style? Is it something you had been looking for and couldn't find? Is it a special homemade treat? Mmmm.) WRITE IT DOWN.

While letter-writing or even emailing may seem like a chore, there are times when a handwritten note is the most appropriate means of communicating one's thoughts. 
